Project Focus:



This month the Project Focus is on our Beef and Fiber Arts Projects. Each 4-H project offers a variety of activities and learning opportunities to suit your interests and strengths. Whether you're just getting started or taking your knowledge to the next level, there are several activities to learn and do throughout your project experience!

BEEF

Beginner Beef youth - Identify breeds of beef cattle, Learn the parts of a calf, Compare animal differences, Halter break a calf

Intermediate Beef youth - Learn about cattle feeds and how they are digested, Judge beef cattle and present oral reasons, Show a calf and learn showing techniques

Advanced Beef youth - Use performance data to make breeding decisions, evaluate beef carcasses and identify meat products, explore impact of technology and career opportunities in the beef industry.

FIBER ARTS

Have you ever wondered how your grandmother crocheted that scarf for you or embroidered the pillowcases? Have you seen all the trendy crocheted and knitted fashion scarves? Have you looked at the quilt on your mother's bed and wondered how it was made? The fiber arts project will embrace how to make these things. Fiber arts is defined as the practical skills passed down from preceding generations that were developed to provide basic family needs, such as apparel, home furnishings or decorations.

Learning Opportunities:

District 4-H Club Days

District 4-H Club Days is a public speaking contest where 4-H members can perform individually, with a partner or as a club. Club Days includes Show and Tell, Project Talks, Demonstrations, Illustrated Talks, Public Speaking, Digital Presentations, Extemporaneous, CRI - Cover Letter, Resume and Interview, Music, Readings, Skits, and Dance.

District 4-H Club Days will be held Saturday, February 21st at the Ness City High School. Registration flyers are located under the 4-H tab at www.walnutcreek.ksu.edu

Regional 4-H Club Days will be at the Nazarene Church in Dodge City on Saturday, March 7th, for any 4-Her that receives TOP Blue at District 4-H Club Days.

Besides writing a good project talk, demonstration, illustrated talk, or public speech, there are a number of other criteria to consider when polishing your presentation. By using these criteria, your presentation will shine, and you will be effective in getting your points across to your audience.

Appearance Attire should be appropriate for the occasion. That will change for every presentation that you give.



Smile Begin with a smile. A smile can do more for the presentation than any other single item. A smile will relax you, the audience, and the judges and make it easier to present. A smile indicates your interest and enthusiasm for the subject.

Talk positively Don't apologize for your appearance, your limited knowledge of the subject, the amount of time you had to prepare your presentation, or taking up the audience's time. Simply put, do not apologize for anything.

Don't memorize It is best not to write your presentation word for word or memorize it, but you may want to note on index cards certain statements or phrases you don't want to forget. You will need only a word or a short sentence at the most — just enough to bring the thought into focus.



Voice Speak clearly and distinctly to make sure you are being heard. Be careful not to speak too fast or drop your voice at the end of sentences. Do not run your words together or speak too softly.



Make eye contact Remember to maintain eye contact. You should be looking at your audience about 75 percent of the time. If you notice that people in the back of the room have lost interest, think about what you're saying, and adjust your delivery accordingly. By the way, you'll never know if this is happening unless you look at the audience you're speaking to — so look.

Choose words wisely Simple analogies, stories, illustrations, metaphors, and personal examples can help your audience understand you. • Be smooth. Avoid long clauses. Use contractions. • Be vivid; appeal to the senses. • Keep your audience in step with you. Use transitions, list points, enumerate, summarize. • Be at ease with a moment's silence. Don't fill in with um, you know, okay, let's see, or like. • Don't tell jokes. In most cases, they are best left to professional entertainers. • Be convincing. Show your audience that what you have to say is important to them.

Registration is now open for the 2026 K-State Junior Producer Days! Junior Beef Producer Day will be Saturday, March 7, with Junior Sheep Producer Day scheduled for Saturday, April 11. Both events will be hosted at the new Bilbrey Family Events Center, north of the K-State campus in Manhattan. These events are one-day educational events for families to learn more about the selection and management of a specific specie. Youth, adults, extension agents, project leaders, and volunteers of all ages and skill levels are invited to attend! Presentations will be provided by K-State faculty, staff, students, extension agents, former exhibitors, and guest speakers. Topics range from selection, to nutrition, reproduction, health, clipping and grooming, and showmanship. This is a family learning event! Everyone who plans to attend must register, including both youth and adults. The cost is \$20/person by the deadline, or \$30 after the deadline for both events. Only those who register by the appropriate deadline will receive a t-shirt.

Pen Pal Program is Back this Spring

K-States' 4-H International Exchange Programs has announced that their Pen Pal Program will be back April 1 to June 1. 4-H'ers and others 9-18 as of April 1 are eligible to participate. More information on partner countries for the program will be announced as available, but the communications will be in English and pen pals are likely in countries with which States' 4-H conducts exchange programs. Youth who are pen pals are to commit to writing a weekly message by email or letter during April and May. There will be a \$10 registration fee to participate which will be payable online. We expect registrations will open in the next few weeks to meet their March 20 deadline. If this is your first year in any livestock projects you need to take the class, If you turn 10 this year you need to take the class, if you turn 14 this year you need to take the class. Everyone must take it their first year showing, and then again when they advance to a new age group. The age groups are 7-9, 10-13, 14-18.

Also, if you are planning to participate in Kansas Junior Livestock Show, Kansas State Fair or any National shows you will need to take the class every year.
